### Survey Background

- Statewide survey results based on a statewide survey of 622 Latinx residents of Massachusetts.
- Conducted July 3-13, 2020 via live telephone and online interviewing in English and Spanish.
- Data was weighted to known population parameters on age, gender, education, nationality background, and region.

### Young people describe barriers to voting

- Young people identify more barriers to participating in elections when compared to older people.
- Language barriers are the least common barrier, and do not pose greater challenges to young people.



## Turnout varies by age

• Among registered voters in 2016, voter file analysis finds turnout rates varied greatly by age, both for Latinx voters and voters overall.






## Biden is overwhelming choice

• Biden with very large lead over Trump among registered voters. Younger voters less certain of their vote.

## Different census participation rates


- Older people, those with higher levels of education and income more likely to have filled out the Census.
- Less than half of younger people, those not registered to vote have participated.

### Education tops open-end issue priority

- In an open-ended format, education (26%) is the top issue that Latinx residents say the Mass. state legislature should focus on.
- Jobs/economy (23%) and COVID-19 (21%) are close behind.
- The survey was fielded during the nationwide protests - 14% named BLM, the protests, and race relations as issue priorities.

### Many issues jockey for top priority

• Jobs, health care, and education top the list of issue priorities in a closedended format, although many items are closely bundled together.



## Broad support for BLM movement

• Most Latinx residents (59%) say they "strongly" support the Black Lives Matter movement, 80% total support.






*Q: Do you support or oppose the Black Lives Matter movement? And is that strongly (support/oppose) or somewhat?* 

## **Comparing support for BLM**

• Compared to the state as a whole and the country, support for the Black Lives Matter movement is particularly strong among Latinx residents of Massachusetts.

#### Non-connection rates: online classrooms

- Rates of "non-connection" refer to not reporting regular participation.
- Non-connection rates highest for those with language, tech barriers and those with lower incomes.



% of parents who did not report receiving regular participation in online classrooms





### Language barriers and remote learning

% of parents who say their child \_\_\_\_\_ at least a few times a week







## COVID-19's disparate impact

- COVID-19 has had a disproportionate impact on communities of color, though many cases remain unclassified.
- Official counts suggest 3-4.5% of Latinx population has tested positive.



The following caveats apply to these data:

- 1. Information on race and ethnicity is collected and reported by laboratories, healthcare providers and local boards of health and may or may not reflect self-report by the individual case.
- 2. If no information is provided by any reporter on a case's race or ethnicity, DPH classifies it as missing.
- 3. A classification of unknown indicates the reporter did not know the race and ethnicity of the individual, the individual refused to provide information, or that the originating system does not capture the information. 4. Other indicates multiple races or that the originating system does not capture the information.

**Note**: COVID-19 testing is currently conducted by dozens of private labs, hospitals, and other partners and the Department of Public Health is working with these organizations and to improve data reporting by race and ethnicity, to better understand where, and on whom, the burden of illness is falling so the Commonwealth can respond more effectively. On 4/8, the Commissioner of Public Health issued an Order related to collecting complete demographic information for all confirmed and suspected COVID-19 patients.

#### Exposure results - overall

- In all, 12% of all Latinx residents report someone in their household has had COVID-like symptoms, 9% tried to get tested.
- Among those who tried to get tested, 72% said everyone in their household who wanted to was able to do, 23% said only some were able to, while a small minority (3%) said no one was able to get tested.
- Among those who got tested, 49% tested positive (representing 4% of all Latinx residents).



#### Exposure results – essential workers

- Essential workers have been on the front lines of the COVID-19 crisis. They are also less likely to have worked from home since the crisis began.
- Essential workers are more likely to have had symptoms.

### Exposure results –insurance, employment

• Those without health insurance and those unemployed report higher rates of symptoms and testing than the overall Latinx population.



## Mental health challenges

 Those who are unemployed, and those who have had COVID symptoms in the household are also more likely to describe mental health challenges, compounding the crisis.

### Economic distress since crisis began


- While 21% of the state's population are in the higher distress categories, this jumps to 50% of Latinx residents (from May MPG housing survey).
- Based on missed housing payments, food insecurity, lost pay, and job losses since coronavirus started.

### Lower-income & employment consequences

• Those who live in lower-income households are more likely to have lost wages and lost a job, while being less likely to have worked remotely.

#### Lower-income face economic consequences

- The impact on savings is more even across income groups, suggesting many economic consequences are widespread.
- But a very acute consequence needing food donations is more likely among the lower-income.



## Business size and demographics

• Different COVID impacts by size exacerbate race and gender disparities for business owners.

Q: What was the company's gross business revenue in 2019? A rough estimate is fine.



• Black and Latinx-owned business were somewhat less likely to report applying for PPP loans.

% of MA small business with owners who identify as \_\_\_\_\_ who applied for a PPP loan






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# Missed payments vary considerably

- Non-white-owned business more likely to report have missed a payment.
- Businesses closer to Boston are also struggling more with missed payments.
